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The MetroHealth System's Compass Services Awarded \$1.2 million Grant to Create an App for Young People Living with HIV

(Cleveland) – The MetroHealth System's Compass Services is the recipient of a \$1.2 million grant from The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to create an app for young adults living with HIV. MetroHealth is one of ten organizations across the U.S. to be awarded the funding.

The demonstration projects were chosen based on proposals outlining innovative social media methods to identify, link, and retain HIV positive underserved, underinsured, hard-to-reach youth and young adults (ages 13-34) in HIV primary care and supportive services.

Compass Services, a support program offered at MetroHealth for people living with HIV/AIDS, will use the funding to create the Positive Peers App which will provide health management tools and a virtual community to connect people ages 16-34 living with HIV. The app will feature information, social networking and self-management tools to support HIV-related holistic care. Positive Peers will be made available to this young adult population at MetroHealth as a password-protected application, accessible only through a confidential registration process.

MetroHealth is partnering with two local Cleveland companies, Blue Star Design and Blackbird, to create the application architecture, content and tools for the Positive Peers app, which will support and improve retention in care and clinical outcomes for young patients living with HIV/AIDS. An evaluator from Kent State University's School of Public Health will investigate the associations of user engagement and activation with self-management behavior, perceptions of stigma and retention in HIV care.
